Activity Descriptions

Dig into Archaeology – Students will “go on a dig” to discover how archaeologists perform their job. They will learn how to use the tools of an archaeologist to map a site. Students will then move to analyzing the artifacts in order to discover the various peoples living in Wisconsin for the past 10,000 years.

Estuary Ed-Ventures – Must be at least 12 years old to participate. On the water explorations using safe, stable, double-seated kayaks to experience the ecology of Lake Superior’s freshwater estuaries. Learn how the region’s geology, culture, and history have shaped these unique coastal wetlands. Conducted on sheltered Fish and Whittlesey Creek estuaries.
